

Kiss Your Stash Goodbye Confetti Scarf

Supplies:

- Dissolve-Away Mesh stabilizer (BLS500-20)
- Or Rinse Away Tear-Away stabilizer (BLT110-15)





A free motion Echo or Glide foot for your machine



- Assorted Fabric Scraps
- Thread
 - The top thread can be any color that works with your fabrics
 - The bobbin thread will not show, so Denise used up all her partially wound bobbins on one of the scarfs
 - So it is up to you whether you wind matching bobbins or not
- 1. Cut your fabric scraps into small random pieces
 - Denise laid the fabric on the cutting board and then rolled the rotary cutter back and forth to cut the small pieces
- 2. Cut a length of stabilizer the length desired for your scarf

3. Fold the stabilizer to create a double layer of stabilizer the length of the scarf

- 4. Place the Echo or Glide foot on the machine
 - This foot is designed to hover above the fabric as you are quilting
 - The bowl shape of the foot prevents it catching under loose edges of the fabric
- Drop the feed dogs on your machine and select a straight stitch so your machine is ready for free motion sewing if you are using a sewing machine
- 6. Start at one corner of the folded stabilizer
- 7. Place a handful of your scraps between the two layers of stabilizer
 - More fabric will be added as you work
- 8. Stitch free motion through the stabilizer and fabric
- 9. Go ahead and sew as fast as you can
 - There is no special pattern to be followed
 - The quilting just needs to catch all the fabric scraps
- 10. If you see a hole that needs a fabric scrap, it is ok to place a piece on top of the stabilizer and sew it down
- 11. Continue adding fabric and stitching as you work your way down the length of stabilizer



- 12. Take the scarf to a hot water bath to remove all of the stabilizer
- 13. Dry it and you are ready to wear it
